

## Religious Education - a Statement of Intent, Implementation and Impact

## Intent

The principal aim of religious education is to explore what people believe and what difference this makes to how they live, so that pupils can gain the knowledge, understanding and skills needed to handle questions raised by religion and belief, reflecting on their own ideas and ways of living.

By the end of key stage 2, our children should:

- identify and explain the core beliefs and concepts studied, using examples from texts/sources of authority in religions
- describe examples of ways in which people use texts/sources of authority to make sense of core beliefs and concepts
- give meanings for texts/sources of authority studied, comparing these ideas with some ways in which believers interpret texts/sources of authority
- make clear connections between what people believe and how they live, individually and in communities
- using evidence and examples, show how and why people put their beliefs into practice in different ways, e.g. in different communities, denominations or cultures
- make connections between the beliefs and practices studied, evaluating and explaining their importance to different people (e.g. believers and atheists)
- reflect on and articulate lessons people might gain from the beliefs/ practices studied, including their own responses, recognising that others may think differently
- consider and weigh up how ideas studied in this unit relate to their own experiences and experiences of the world today, developing insights of their own and giving good reasons for the views they have and the connections they make

## Implementation

Religious Education learning follows the Shropshire Agreed Syllabus for RE (2021-26). Lessons are planned and delivered in a variety of ways ensuring that all children can access and participate in lessons. Interactive, practical activities encourage the children to discuss their ideas and extend their understanding of difficult concepts and challenging questions.

## **Impact**

Children will enjoy learning about other religions and why people choose, or choose not to follow a religion. Children will make links between their own lives and those of others in their community and in the wider world, developing an understanding of other people's cultures and ways of life. Children will be able to express their ideas and explain their thinking.
